

"It's going to be a hot one" I muttered to no one in particular as I closed the sliding glass door behind me upon entering the lanai. The calendar had just flipped to June but the heaviness of the air made it seem more like the dog days of summer. Curious expression. My mind flashed back to my Roman History professor explaining that the phrase came about as the ancient Romans noticed that the hottest days of the year, in late July and early August, coincided with the appearance of Sirius - the Dog Star, in the same part of the sky as the Sun thereby contributing to the heat of the day. Last night I couldn't remember where I parked my car after coming out of Publix. And now this morning I am remembering an anecdote from my college days. Mercifully, the doorbell rang and I was transported back to 2023.

It was good to see my friend back from a short trip over on the east coast. I had received his text notification each day confirming that he had tended to his morning devotion and I was curious to hear about his efforts with the evening review which we talked about in our last meeting. But first I wanted to hear how the trip with his wife and the kids went. "It was great," my friend declared. "I believe that doing this work is really helping me a ton. I even brought my books with me on the trip and got up early to catch my quiet time before the gang got up. Even my wife joked to her mom that I had been 'born again'. Her mom has never been my biggest fan, I guess I can't blame her for that. At some point, I would like to talk to you about doing some inventory on her so I can make a proper amend. Don't know how I missed that on my 4th Step. To be honest, I never considered it. I guess that was because I didn't have a major resentment toward her but now I am starting to see it differently. Resentment or not, I am sure I hurt her with my antics when I was drinking."

"No worries," I said smiling. "This might turn out to be a good thing. Making amends can be a tricky process, especially if we are going in by ourselves." "Right", my friend responded. "Wait a minute. Are you saying that you're willing to come with me when I go over to make the amends to my mother-in-law?" I laughed. "No, I wasn't talking about bringing me along. I was talking about your Higher Power. Remember what the book says at the bottom of page 87, *As we go through the day we pause, when agitated or doubtful, and ask for the right thought or action. We constantly remind ourselves we are no longer running the show, humbly saying to ourselves many times each day 'Thy will be done.'*

"We haven't talked much about the relationship between Steps 10 and 11 but once again, another example of the power of the synergy in the steps." "Hold on," my friend interrupted, "you said that synergy meant the working together of two things to produce an effect greater than the sum of their individual effects, correct?" "Bingo, my friend," I responded. "And Steps 10 and 11 are exactly that. Think about it. You may recall that I said working on Step 11 is an element of fulfilling that 3rd Step contract that we talked about. Think back to the line on page 63, "... *He provided what we needed if we kept close to Him and performed His work well."*"

"Step 11 gives directions on how we can keep close to Him. What to do in the evening, what to do in the morning, and what to do as we go through the day. I believe that when you stay close to Him, God provides what you need to get through your life. No task is too big, and no task is too small. The key is to open up that channel to our Higher Power and we do that by following those directions in the book. I recognize that it is not simple or easy, certainly, it takes practice, patience, and persistence. Or perhaps one word says it all – discipline. And the chapter closes with Bill Wilson stating, 'We alcoholics are undisciplined.'"

"Yeah," I said. "That is not uncommon. It is a perfect metaphor, however. To lose weight, and get in shape, requires commitment, dare I say, discipline. We must understand that we have to transfer that same dedication that we brought to the gym to our spiritual exercises if we want to make progress. A friend of mine used to say that just going to meetings and not working Steps 10 and 11 in your life is like going to the gym, not doing any exercise, just sitting in the corner, and smoking a cigarette." My friend nearly spits up his coffee and reached for a napkin on the table. "Come on man, you're killing me!" he bellowed. "I get your point though, that makes sense. Spiritual progress requires effort just as it does on the physical plane but I am not sure I follow you on the connection between Steps 10 and 11. How do you see them being related?"

I responded, "Have you ever heard the expression that if you take the Steps off the wall you will get an off-the-wall program?" "Yes, but I never gave it much thought," my friend replied, "What am I missing?" I nodded and said, "OK, think of it this way. Step 10, on the wall, says, *'Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it'*, right? For a long time, before I got into studying the text of the Big Book, I took that to mean that the 10th Step was for damage control, it only applied when I have upset somebody." My friend looked perplexed and so I paused. "Soooooooo, it's not?" my friend tilted his head to the side and frowned. "Well it is but it is much more than that," I responded, "But perhaps we are getting ahead of ourselves. There is a lot to this and that is one of the beautiful aspects of this work. The deeper you go, the more satisfying it is. No resting on our laurels for us, my friend!"

I smiled and said, "Before we go too far down this path let's talk evening review, how is that going?" "Pretty good," my friend declared seemingly pleased to be getting back to something he was familiar with. "In our last conversation where we went through the mechanics of the process and you gave me that handout with the questions to use for the review, I walked away thinking that it was going to be pretty easy and that I could knock it off in a few minutes. And for a couple of nights, that is exactly what I did. I was like, 'Was I selfish? – No! Was I dishonest? – No!' But then what stopped me in my tracks was that darn '*Were we kind and loving to all*?' And it dawned on me and this goes back to what you were just saying about Step 10. No, I didn't say or do anything that would require me to make an amend but was I kind and loving to everyone I interacted with that day? Holy cow! Not even close!"

"I get it, man," I said shaking my head in amusement. "It's unbelievable, right? What happens is that when we engage in this evening review process we begin to become aware of not only our actions during the day but also our thoughts. And that opens the door to a whole other side of inventory, not just our behavior but also our thinking. See, I couldn't get a perfect score on the evening review if I was tied up, blindfolded, and gagged in my garage for an entire day because my thinking would most assuredly be out of whack!" "Nice visual," my friend shot back, "But again, I get your point.

I continued, "My problem is that as an alcoholic my 'default setting' is restless, irritable, and discontented. That's what I have to work with when I wake up in the morning. Some days are worse than others but my challenge is always where do I go next? On any given day I can either go up to happy, joyous, and free, or down to the bedevilments. As an alcoholic, I am a *victim of the delusion that I can wrest satisfaction and happiness out of this world if I only manage well*. The Step 10 'spot-check' and the Step 11 evening review are the tools to help me to keep my eye on the prize, that is, how can I do God's will and help others. If I am not spiritually fit, I can't do that."

"I get it, man," my friend responded. "I am curious to know more about the synergy between Steps 10 and 11 but you kind of blew up my whole understanding of Step 10 so I guess I better buckle up, it's going to be a bumpy ride." I laughed, "No, not at all as long as you are willing to let go of some old ideas. But I do think that at this point some coffee is in order, be right back." June 2023

God as I Misunderstood Him Jim B. Bonita Springs, FL Step Group

I'm going to talk about God.

Whoa! Wait a minute. This is AA. You need to say "A Power Greater Than Yourself" or "Your Higher Power." This isn't a religious organization. That "G:" word turns a lot of us alcoholics off in a big way.

Yeah. I've been there. What I'm sharing here is my own experience, strength and hope. Your mileage may vary. I'd like to talk to you about what I've experienced, the strength I have found in Alcoholics Anonymous and my hopes for tomorrow that I'd like to pass along to you.

To begin, I was raised in a family that had a mother and a father. They were devout Roman Catholics and raised my two brothers and I in that faith. Mass every Sunday and prescribed "Holy Days of Obligation." When I reached the appropriate age, I made my first Confession and First Communion. That was a big deal in my family. My parents threw a big party and all the fextended family (also Catholics) brought me gifts and we had a cake. I remember the cake had a Catholic Rosary decorating it.

I had no problem with the Catholic Church until I reached puberty. Then things started to fall apart. The nuns who taught me in the parochial school had told me that an angel was assigned to each of us to record our behavior, marking a plus or a minus next to every thought, word and deed. Puberty threw that ledger for a loop. All I seemed to think about was girls — their smells, their figures nd their attention. I was naturally shy, so much of my inner feeling remained inside. But to that angel, it didn't matter. If I thought about it, I had committed the sin. My only hope was to confess it and received absolution. The big probelm was that I couldn't bring myself to say these thoughts aloud to the priest. So I fudged my words, using words like "I had impure thoughts" rather than the reality of sneaking girlie magazines and masturbating. I received "absolution" for minor infractions, while the big ones remained. I was told to vow never to commit these offenses again, but I knew I couldn't keep that vow.

Thus the Communion that I took the next day was corrupted by my continuing "sins." That was another mortal sin. The ledger kept piling up with these mortal sins until I knew that I was condemned to everlasting fire. I couldn't live with that, so I turned my back on the Catholic Church and its teachings.

To my mind, that meant turning away from God in any form.

I wandered through life that way for the next twenty years. I called myself an Agnostic rather than an Atheist. I was willing to accept that there might be a God, but he had no interest in me. During that time, I violated just about every moral principle I had been taught.

I went to college and discovered the healing properties of alcohol. The magic elixir that allowed me to be comfortable in my skin for a time. Over the years, that time became shorter and shorter, until it disappeared altogether leaving only the need for alcohol behind.

I was confronted by my drinking by my superior, who said we could probably deal with it, if I admitted a had a problem. I said I did, not because I believed it, but to keep my job. I was working for my father-in-law at the time.

Then came Alcoholics Anonymous. The vice president of the company was a member of Alcoholics Anonymous with 10 years sobriety. He left the office, hopped on a plane and flew a thousand miles to spend the day with me. He never asked me any questions. He talked about himself. We went to dinner and the conversation continued. What I remember most was that he smiled most of the time, even when relating some awful episodes. After dinner we went to my first AA meeting. That was 40 years ago.

Little by little, through the fellowship and attending hundreds of meetings, I started to take some actions that I never would have predicted I would do. I got a sponsor (though I waited 2 years to develop enough humility to admit I need one.) He told me of the necessity of finding a "Higher Power" that I should pray to each day, if only to say "Thy will, not mine, be done." I had been using AA as my higher power up to that time. I was willing to say the first part of that abbreviated prayer, but couldn't bring myself to give up my will.

I told him that I didn't believe in a God that I could pray to. He gave me an assignment that changed my life. He told me to go home and make a list. If there was a God that I could pray to, what would be the characteristics of that God.

I listed my requirements such as: does not condemn me for my past sins, loves me as I am, is all forgiving, won't turn His back on me — ever, The list included some other requirements that I expected the God I was raised to believe in wouldn't be interested it. I brought the list to my sponsor. He looked it over and smiled.

"That is God as you understand Him."

That's all it took. That wall between God and me, that I had built and maintained for decades, crumbled at that moment. I was free.

My understanding of God has changed over the years, but that's because I have changed, not God. God blessed me with Alcoholics Anonymous and the members who have encouraged and supported me over these past 40 years.

I pass along this hope to anyone who is still struggling to find God as you understand Him. He's right there waiting for you to give Him a chance.

Desperation is a Great Motivator

Sincerity is a Great Healer

Recovery in Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) affects people in many ways. The first and most obvious is their ability to abstain from the use of alcohol for without that there can be no recovery. Next is the willingness to abandon the idea that they can do this on their own and to seek the help of something outside of their own failed way of thinking. Third is the act of surrendering and "buying in" completely (so to speak}. At this point, the recovery process may differ depending on your age, gender, economic situation, marital status, legal woes, and other side issues. It is not our role to judge anyone who comes to A.A. seeking help nor is it our job to bail them out of their current situation out of sympathy.

That does not mean that we cannot buy a meal for a hungry soul or give them a few bucks for gas. We are recovering alcoholics and our role is to listen and to try to understand what they need from us consistent with the principles we have learned and relate our experiences with them. Younger arrivals usually are duel addicted and the average long-term alcoholic that has not experienced the drug culture lifestyle may have a difficult time identifying with them. Recovered addicts usually share about their Rip Off mentality as a user, while the average common variety alcoholic talks about guilt and shame and the need to pay their bar-tab. A high percentage of our membership arrive in their forties in the middle of, or on the cusp of the threat of a divorce, and without experienced feed -back, make bad decisions where, in some cases, they could have salvaged their marriage and saved the children the damage caused by divorce. My main question when greeting a newcomer at a meeting is usually "What brings you to A.A.?"

Usually, their response comes in the form of a complaint about the situation they are in, (divorce papers, Dui, Fired from job) etc. My next question is, (If that hadn't happened, would you be here today?" Their response is usually, "Probably not." I then explain that my first wife could have filed for divorce ten times before she became Desperate enough to do it and, had she not, I would, still be out there circling the drain or worse. For two years I tried to convince her to take me back, but it did not happen. Desperation brought me to the door of A.A. where I began the life I live today. This type of perspective usually gets their attention, and they often turn out to be more accepting of the need to change. Next, I will share the experience that worked or me. It may come in a sincere statement such as," I know that I have been wrong about what a husband/father's responsibilities are and that I am an alcoholic and I believe that I've found the solution to my drinking problem. You have suffered from all of this, and I have learned greatly from the mistakes I have made, and I intend to do my best to make it right. Whatever the outcome is, I want to minimize the trauma to the children as we move forward." This type of sincerity sometimes takes the pressure off and gives her some breathing room and in some cases, opens the door to salvaging the marriage. My question is: Can you live up to these proposed actions?

Another area where sincerity and ownership of past mistakes has an unexpected outcome is in the courtroom. Judges have heard every flimsy excuse in the world and can see right through all the BS of a con artists, and they are not fooled by them. Believe me when I say that I have witnessed more than my share of these two approaches to resolving the damages of alcoholic behavior, and the sincere approach far outweighs the con job, most of the time, and you cannot fake sincerity.

JUDIASM and the LORD'S PRAYER

As a Jewish member of Alcoholics Anonymous, I've been concerned about the fact that so many meetings end in the Lord's Prayer. While I was willing to go to any lengths to get--and stay--sober, I was worried about reciting a prayer that might in some way compromise my Jewish identity.

So I talked with my rabbi, who is knowledgeable not just about Jewish affairs but also about the Twelve Steps. He is Orthodox and the leader of an extremely large Jewish congregation. He does a lot of work visiting treatment centers, and he knows a lot about AA. Probably more than I do.



He explained to me that there is nothing in the Lord's Prayer--or in all of the Twelve Steps, for that matter--that in any way contradicts anything in traditional Judaism. He pointed out that many of the phrases in the Lord's Prayer actually come from Jewish prayers in use two thousand years ago and still current today. While the Lord's Prayer is used primarily by Christians, its origins are firmly rooted in the Jewish prayer book.

Now, I'm no scholar (although I've written a few books about Judaism), and I can't locate all of the phrases in Jewish liturgy off the top of my head, but I know a few, and perhaps these will give some sense of how the Lord's Prayer was assembled.

Our Father who art in heaven = Avinu shebashamiyim

That Hebrew phrase, Avinu shebashamiyim, has been used for millenia to start prayers. The most recent use came in the Prayer For The State of Israel, composed after the founding of Israel in 1948.

Hallowed be thy name = Yiskadal v'yiskadash sh'may rabbo

This Aramaic formation is extremely familiar to Jews as the first line of the Kaddish (the Mourner's Prayer) and also the prayer that separates sections of the Orthodox prayer service.

Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven = ba'shamayim me'ma'al u'va' aretz mitachas

This line from the "aleinu" prayer, said at the conclusion of each prayer service and in the important Mussaf service on Yom Kippur, the Jewish Day of Atonement, translates as "in the heavens above and on the earth below."

Give us this day our daily bread = Hu nosain lechem l'chol basar

This comes from the first paragraph of the Jewish Grace After Meals. The meaning is that God gives bread to all beings.

And forgive us our trespasses = She'tislach lanu al cal chatosainu

"Forgive us for all of our sins" reads this line repeated many times in the Yom Kippur prayers.

For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory = L'cha, adoshem

The Jewish phrase translates as "the greatness and the power and the glory." This is a line recited in a Sabbath morning prayer just prior to the reading of the Torah in the synagogue.

Forever and ever = L'dor va'dor

Literally, this means "from generation to generation."

Amen = Amen Amen is actually a Hebrew word from the verb "to believe." In a prayer or a room--or in a Jewish court of law-to answer "Amen" after a statement is to say, "I believe this."

So you see that as a believing Jew, when I'm saying the Lord's Prayer, I'm saying a compilation of excerpts of prayers that are a part of the traditional Jewish prayer book. I hope that this makes things more comfortable for other Jews.

Neglect, The Elephant in the Room

Continuous Credibility Leads to Integrity By Rick R.– Miami, FL

When we are satisfied that we have given steps one through five our best effort and have identified the most glaring defects of character and shortcomings, it is now time to affect the changes in the most obvious of our faulty thoughts and the behaviors that stem from those thoughts by addressing them in *steps six and seven*. To be successful in this endeavor, we must first get honest with ourselves and begin to *establish some credibility* and by that, I mean *always doing the things we say we are going to do. We bring most of the basic flaws out in the open* as we become aware of them. Then, if we are sure that we are committed to the program, we will want to set in place, principles to live by that cut off our own escape when we stumble and want to revert to that old way of thinking.

Most of us do this with the help of a sponsor or a mentor, if you like, and go by the book as best we can. I did what I thought was a thorough job of it, then one day, about thirty years ago, I was trying to park my car in a somewhat crowded parking lot and as I found the spot, I wanted there was a shopping cart blocking my way. I got out of my car and moved the cart aside, then parked my car. I then got that shopping cart and pushed it back to the store entrance, then went about my business.

From that day on, when parking at any market, I search for a stray shopping cart and take it back to the store just to make up for all the times I shoved one into the flower bed and drove away. After telling that story at meetings over the years, I hear people telling how it is uncomfortable for them to leave the cart adrift in the parking lot, and we all get a big laugh out of it. Neglect, I can tell, the word *neglect* is only mentioned two times in the Big Book (pg. 97 and pg. 129) and two times in the 12&12. (pg. 81 and pg. 151) And seldom, if ever, has it been the topic of a meeting that I can recall. It is like the proverbial *elephant in the room*.

As I started to catch myself shirking my responsibilities it became obvious to me that if I wanted to regain some form of self-respect and dignity, I was going to have to put the word *Neglect* on my list of shortcomings and *question my integrity*. Do I do what is right even when there is no one watching? If credibility is *always doing what I say I am going to do, then Integrity,* to me, is *a whole bunch of credibility*. To cut off my own escape I do routine things every day, that cost me nothing and the result of that is a clear conscience. If I am doing the little things that I should, I find it much easier to give the big things that same sort of attention. I never throw trash out of the car window, I pick up after myself, I never walk away from my bed in the morning without making it, and I liken that to being an unspoken prayer saying, I will be responsible, I will be orderly, I will be neat, and I will not be neglectful, I will be respectful, I will stay on the unselfish side of the ledger in all of my decisions, I sometimes revisit those pages in the Big Book and the 12&12 and I try my best not to ignore *the elephant in the room*. "I inched a little bit closer to AA and a little bit closer to myself ... I was suddenly a part of things, no longer just a shadow figure pulled toward the edge by the centrifugal force of my own fears."
