Editorial: On The Eight Step

"Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.

It was characteristic of many of us as alcoholics to at least attempt to perform in the grandiose manner. And in harming others we usually succeeded magnificently. So, to say that the first phase of the Eighth Step is a large order is to indulge in understatement which matches our bombastic style.

And yet, however extended be the list of those we have harmed, the fulfillment of this step's admonition need not be a tedious nor a burdensome undertaking. In the first place, let's examine the meaning of the verb: Amend.

Webster's New International Dictionary defines it thus --"To make better, especially in character; to repair, restore; to free from faults, put right, correct, rectify..."

There is the credo to which we of A.A. subscribe; the goal we hope to achieve through sobriety. It is both the manifestation of our adherence to the other 11 Steps and our performance of the Eighth itself.

The definition continues:

"... to change or modify in any way for the better; to recover from illness." It was written for us!

We have often heard that our sobriety should be founded on "unselfish selfishness", that we should strive to avoid a lapse into drinking for the benefits we, personally, derive from abstinence. It's not sound, we have been told, to try to stay dry for the sake of a wife or a sweetheart or someone else dear to us.

When we first heard that plan of action outlined, we revolted mildly because it didn't seem to meet the specifications of true altruism. Many of us, as we entered A.A., still yearned for that mystic power to "handle" alcohol and it seemed then that the step we were taking was at least in part --a gesture of devotion to some loved one. Without altruism there didn't seem to be much motive to propel us.

Of course, we soon discovered that "unselfish selfishness" was the firmest foundation for our recovery. We found, in the same way, that we try to help others, not solely through altruistic impulse, but so that we may gain strength.

The principle of "unselfish selfishness" is applicable again in the Eighth Step. We seek to identify all those we have harmed and we assume a willingness to make amends so that --recalling the definition of the word --we may "change . . . for the better" and "recover from illness."

The alternative is retrogression. If we fail to "repair", we can only impair.

- 6. In my own AA life, have I any experiences which illustrate the wisdom of this Tradition?
- 7. Have I paid enough attention to the book Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions? To the pamphlet AA Tradition – How It Developed?

An Education in the Art of Living

Sharing our Experience, Strength, and Hope By Rick R.

For the newcomer, the first 164 pages of the Big Book contain the framework of how to overcome the disaster of a life consumed by Alcoholism. As I drank myself into the corner of life and ran out of options, I desperately searched for answer, and something told me to try Alcoholics Anonymous (AA). And, there I found People who had overcome most of the troubling issues of life.

Each chapter in the Big Book (Alcoholics Anonymous) has a certain subject, and they try to explain specific areas of our lives where we could improve our thoughts and behaviors. It seems that if we did what they suggested in those 164 pages everything would be fine with us alcoholics; but wait! Next, they published <u>The Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions (12&12)</u> to give more amplifying information as to how to incorporate the steps into our daily lives. As I continued to progress in the program it caused me to seek a vastly more serious understanding of the depth of this disease and how serious my symptoms were.

The first 164 pages just scratched the surface, but they gave me a challenge as to what degree of commitment I would pursue as I began to uncover defect after defect in a Thousand Facets of my sick mentality. Fear, insecurity, and my EGO dogged my every step and as I become strong enough to overcome my Ego driven approach to these issues, my CONSCIENCE started getting a foothold; and, it motivated me to dig deeper yet and pursue a life based on unselfish Principles and to abandon the faulty thinking of the past.

As I continued to grow, I had to come to terms with the understanding of a POWER GREATER THAN MYSELF and I was encouraged to read a book by Emmet Fox entitled "<u>The Sermon on the Mount</u>" considered to be the inspiration that the founders of the A A program incorporated into the SPIRITUAL SOLUTION to the doubters like me. It removed all those doubts.

Next, I had to learn how to become a good Husband, Father, Friend, Coworker, and so on. As we shared our experiences with each other we are in the state of learning how to solve those THOUSAND FACETS of our sick mentality. My wife came home from an Al Anon meeting, in my early years of sobriety, all excited about the topic of "Examining our Motives. That one little statement changed my entire way of thinking about my behavioral problems. SELFISHNESS---Self-centeredness! That, we think, is the root of our troubles. (BB pg.62) If selfishness is the root, (motive) then unselfishness is the obvious solution. That simple understanding set, in place, a habit of living by unselfish motives. And, as a result, I am not ashamed of anything I do today. I have a clear conscience; and, it is so much easier than I thought it would be. It does not say generous, it just says unselfish. DUH!

The world is full of supporting information concerning all the facets of the different mental troubles the alcoholic is faced with when seeking answers. When we use the word: LOVE, I thought it was a feeling. But, I found a version of Love in a book by Scott Peck's, <u>The Road less Traveled</u> that defines Love as: Caring for and Nurturing another Person's Soul. It is an *action* word; and, I can Love everyone even if they do not love me back, by wanting the best for them and offering my help. Using these examples is my way of encouraging everyone who finds it difficult to experience the quiet satisfaction that they expect to receive from the program ... to find the answers by looking deeper into the subject and seek out the answers that help you to set in place those unselfish Principles and Habits which lead to, as an old friend refers to as: Peace of Mind and a Quiet Heart.

Love Is As Love Does

The longer I attend AA meetings the more aware I become of the evolution of the subject matter of meeting topics.

In my early days in the 1970s, the topic was normally about drunkalogues or whatever the leader wanted to talk about that day. Most of the meetings that I attend today are literature -based meetings and there is amplifying information in the literature that reinforces the topic.

On page 164 of the **<u>Big Book</u>** it says "We realize we know only a little. God will constantly disclose more to you and to us."

Today we have access to all that they had learned up to that point in time plus everything we have learned since then and the sharing in the meetings is so much deeper as the result of those disclosures.

I was at a meeting recently and the topic was "Love without strings" September 28 in the <u>Daily Reflections</u>. It was interesting to hear the differing perceptions, mainly based on the differing lengths of sobriety and how the word Love was perceived.

I looked up the word in the Thesaurus and it is all about feelings like fondness, passion, adoration, affection, and many others.

Over the years, I have heard it said that "I can love him, but I don't have to like him." Is it him I don't like or is it his behavior I don't like?

All of us come to AA with behavioral problems. It is not about him. It is about me being judgmental. There were comments about sexual attraction or "erotic love" which are common in most online definitions but that is not our purpose when dealing with the word Love.

There are many definitions of the word LOVE and for our purpose, I believe the one that Scott Peck writes about in his book "The Road Less Traveled" he defines love as "The will to extend oneself for the purpose of nurturing one's own or another's spiritual growth." He implies that it is not that version that we see on the movie screen.

To me this means that love is, caring for, and nurturing another person. I can love everyone, even if they do not love me back. It is not about them; it implies that it's about me and my actions. As I took this approach, one by one I defused and neutralized all those mental conflicts and accepted everyone exactly as they are. No longer do they crowd my thinking.



Do those people that still have behavior problems sometimes cross my boundaries? Oh yes, they do. Sometimes their <u>EGO</u> is threatened by something I shared at a meeting or in the community and they need to defend their position.

Today I recognize these symptoms in others, and I try to be understanding about what I say at a meeting as to not make him or her uncomfortable. This takes time and I never respond to innuendos when someone is trying to draw me into an argument. It takes two to tango and over a period of time he gets to know who I really am, and he is no longer threatened by the thing I share.

I try to care for and nurture everyone and at some point, in time I have run out of adversaries, that I know of. In fact, I become their best advocate.

Today, the word Love is not a noun. Love is a verb. Love is as Love does. Understand them, wish the best for them, and be willing to help them when you can.

Who could understand the behavior of an alcoholic more than another alcoholic who has experienced their own development in the program?

The founding principles of AA is the caring for and nurturing of another alcoholic. If that is not love, then what is? With all my love, I rest my case.

I Stand By The Door By Sam Shoemaker (from the Oxford Group)

I stand by the door. I neither go to far in, nor stay to far out. The door is the most important door in the world -It is the door through which men walk when they find God. There is no use my going way inside and staying there, When so many are still outside and they, as much as I, Crave to know where the door is. And all that so many ever find Is only the wall where the door ought to be. They creep along the wall like blind men, With outstretched, groping hands, Feeling for a door, knowing there must be a door, Yet they never find it. So I stand by the door.

The most tremendous thing in the world Is for men to find that door - the door to God. The most important thing that any man can do Is to take hold of one of those blind, groping hands And put it on the latch - the latch that only clicks And opens to the man's own touch.

Men die outside the door, as starving beggars die On cold nights in cruel cities in the dead of winter. Die for want of what is within their grasp. They live on the other side of it - live because they have not found it.

Nothing else matters compared to helping them find it, And open it, and walk in, and find Him. So I stand by the door.

Go in great saints; go all the way in -Go way down into the cavernous cellars, And way up into the spacious attics. It is a vast, roomy house, this house where God is. Go into the deepest of hidden casements, Of withdrawal, of silence, of sainthood. Sometimes venture in a little farther, But my place seems closer to the opening. So I stand by the door.

There is another reason why I stand there. Some people get part way in and become afraid Lest God and the zeal of His house devour them; For God is so very great and asks all of us. And these people feel a cosmic claustrophobia And want to get out. 'Let me out!' they cry. And the people way inside only terrify them more. Somebody must be by the door to tell them that they are spoiled. For the old life, they have seen too much: One taste of God and nothing but God will do any more. Somebody must be watching for the frightened Who seek to sneak out just where they came in, To tell them how much better it is inside. The people too far in do not see how near these are To leaving - preoccupied with the wonder of it all. Somebody must watch for those who have entered the door But would like to run away. So for them too, I stand by the door.

I admire the people who go way in. But I wish they would not forget how it was Before they got in. Then they would be able to help The people who have not yet even found the door. Or the people who want to run away again from God. You can go in too deeply and stay in too long And forget the people outside the door. As for me, I shall take my old accustomed place, Near enough to God to hear Him and know He is there, But not so far from men as not to hear them, And remember they are there too.

Where? Outside the door -Thousands of them. Millions of them. But - more important for me -One of them, two of them, ten of them. Whose hands I am intended to put on the latch. So I shall stand by the door and wait For those who seek it.
